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Overview of Round One: What Does It All Mean? <i>The General Elections Commission has announced the results of the first round of the presidential election. The frontrunner, as predicted in the polls, is Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono with 33.58% of the vote. The incumbent President Megawati came in a reasonably close second place at 26.24%. Consequently, Megawati and Yudhoyono will face off in the second round of the presidential election on 20 September 2004.</i>
